LUX RADIO THEATRE

During its more than 15 years on the air, "Lux Radio Theatre" has presented approximately 500 of Hollywood's leading players in virtually all of the screen successes of the period. Its inaugural broadcast in 1934, the adaptation of a screen hit, "Seventh Heaven," for an hour-long radio program, was considered a risky experiment, but the show soon became a top radio attraction and has been a consistent winner of awards. It made radio history when, in 1936, it shifted its base of operations to Hollywood to be near the source of its talent and material. Heading the list for the most performances on the show by Hollywood stars are Loretta Young and Don Ameche, with a score of 21 each.

NATIONAL LISTENERS PANEL



WALTER WINCHELL

Walter Winchell left school at 13 to join the Imperial Trio, singing ushers in a New York movie house who didn't create much of a stir at the time. (Other members of the trio were Eddie Cantor and George Jessel.) In vaudeville, he earned \$100 a week as a hooper but left the stage to write a gossip column for the New York Vaudeville News at \$25 a week. The New York Graphic offered him \$100 a week, which became \$500 four years later and when the Graphic editors objected to his writing for magazines, he moved to the New York Mirror. He made his first broadcast in May, 1930.



JACK BENNY

Benny K. Benny, the violinist, had been on tour for some years when World War I broke out and the Navy put him in a revue to aid recruiting. The crowd roared with laughter one night when he paused to make a few wisecracks. Thereafter he used his fiddle only as a prop in a highly successful vaudeville career. He had already made his movie debut when, in 1932, columnist Ed Sullivan asked him to guest on his radio program. Benny, dubious about the new medium, agreed to appear gratis; the same year he had a sponsor and an NBC network show which was a trail-blazer in radio comedy.



CLUB 15

At 13, Bob Crosby appeared on an amateur show just long enough to flee in terror after the orchestra had played five introductions to his solo. He was not at all discouraged and when the walkathon craze hit his home town of Spokane, Washington, he was often heard on the radio broadcasts from these centers. In 1935, two years after joining Anson Weeks, he became the leader of "The Bobcats" which hit the big time in records, movies and network radio. During the war, Bob spent 18 months in service and in the fall of 1945, organized a new Bobcats group.



THE TELEPHONE HOUR

The "Telephone Hour," launched more than ten years ago on NBC, has featured concerts by the greatest names of the music world and has introduced many young artists to the public. Ezio Pinza is one of the famous performers who appear regularly and among others are Jascha Heifetz, Lily Pons, John Charles Thomas and Marion Anderson. It was on this program that Fritz Kreisler made his radio debut, and Ferruccio Tagliavini his American debut. Such personalities as Bing Crosby, Benny Goodman and Mary Martin have appeared in departures from the regular concert format.

BACKGROUND: Mary does not like to interfere with Larry's career, but lately she has been trying to help. The summer theater production in which Larry starred was so successful that everyone feels it could be a success on Broadway as well. Larry and his friends have been trying for some time to find an "angel"—somebody who will put up

the necessary money for such a venture. **RECENTLY:** It looks very much as if wealthy Rupert Barlow is really impressed by Larry's play. as she struggles with a major difficulty in her own marriage. She has never told Michael much about Kevin Burke, the man she was in love with years ago. Not long ago, Ma Perkins received an unexpected letter. It was from Cousin Bonita Hammacher who was, Ma explained, Pa Perkins' second cousin. It had been a number of years since any of the Perkinses heard from the Hammachers. At the time of a previous letter they had been homesteading in Alaska. Now they were back; of course Ma, with her usual warm hospitality asked Cousin Bonita and Ed, her husband, for a visit.

The Hammachers, it developed, had had considerable trouble. Now they had taken their life savings and were looking for a business to buy so they could settle down in some nice town—like Rushville Center.

Ma felt very close to Cousin Bonita—she looked so much like Pa, and Ma remembered, too, that Pa had always been very fond of Bonita. Of course the memory of Pa Perkins is very precious to Ma. It wasn't hard for her to take Bonita and Ed—and Sylvester, their son who soon joined them—to her heart. Very soon, Ma had what seemed to be a wonderful idea—why not teach Ed and Sylvester the lumber business?

If Fay, Evey and Willy had some doubts about the Hammachers, they didn't express them to Ma—how could they hurt her by disparaging Pa's relatives? Fay and Evey introduced Cousin Bonita to everyone; Willy and Shuffle Shober, Ma's oldest friend and her assistant at the lumber yard, got Ed initiated into their lodges.

Privately, Cousin Ed and his son, Sylvester, were doing some intensive thinking. They recognized the Perkins Lumber Yard as a solid, prosperous business—and decided that they should take it over! Of course it would have to be accomplished by slow stages, but once agreed on the project Cousin Ed, with the help of his son, went to work.

Their first step was to undermine Shuffle, who had been Ma's trusted friend and co-worker for so long. Ed wisely realized that he couldn't manage this with Ma, so he began to undermine Shuffle with Shuffle himself—hints about his getting too old, being soon replaced. BURNS AND ALLEN

Daughter of a San Francisco song-and-dance man, Gracie Allen quit the Allen Sisters' song-and-dance act after a disagreement with the company manager and enrolled in a New York secretarial school. At the time, George Burns, born on New York's East Side, was doing a comedy act and Gracie met him in 1922 when she called on a friend who was appearing on the same bill. They joined hands in a vaudeville act and married in 1925. In 1932, the year after Gracie guested on Eddie Cantor's radio program, they launched their own air show.



HERB SHRINER

Herb Shriner made his bow in show business at 17 as "Harmonica Herb" with a band of four other boys in his home town of Fort Wayne, Ind. He went from radio stations to vaudeville houses to travelling shows, his harmonica becoming a secondary part of his act as he discovered that audiences liked the humorous chatter, cracker barrel style, that he delivered when his mouth began to get chafed. After a season with the Philip Morris show in 1946, he bought a land cruiser, a bus-size vehicle complete with living quarters, and covered 7,000 miles playing dates around the country.
